# To See or Not to See? Hallucinations in Multidisciplinary Perspective

## ABSTRACT:

The project addresses 3 main points:

1) <u>Problem:</u> How to define hallucinations and distinguish them from other mental and sensory states, in particular from illusion? <u>Methodology</u>: Analyze various distinguishing criteria. <u>Results</u>: The most effective criterion is that of lack of intersubjective robustness. However, we argue that no criterion can deal with all problematic cases and suggest a contextual approach.

2) <u>Problem:</u> Is disjunctivism about perception tenable? <u>Methodology</u>: We considered epistemological and empirical problems. <u>Results</u>: Both main versions of disjunctivism (metaphysical and epistemological) fail.

3) <u>Problem</u>: How to explain "phenomenal presence" (PP), the main phenomenological feature common to perception and hallucination? <u>Methodology</u>: Elaboration of desiderata and assessment of the main existing model. <u>Results</u>: We propose a new Attentional Model, initially developed for the visual case.
